Common Testing Questions and Answers

When should I get tested?

Test when you have symptoms such as **sore throat, cough, runny nose, fever, unusual headache**, especially with multiple symptoms or worsening symptoms.

Test when exposed— if you have a close exposure to someone diagnosed with COVID test approximately 5 days following exposure or if symptomatic.

Test immediately before an event with **vulnerable individuals** (older adults, young children, and people with existing health conditions).

What kinds of tests are available?

PCR Test: PCR stands for polymerase chain reaction. It's a test to detect genetic material from a specific organism, such as a virus. The test detects the presence of a virus if you have the virus at the time of the test. The test is very sensitive and is most likely to let you know if you have been infected. However, because it is so sensitive it may also detect virus fragments after you are no longer infected.

Rapid or Antigen Tests: detects proteins from the virus which causes COVID-19. This type of test is considered most accurate in those individuals who are experiencing symptoms of COVID-19

Self-testing: Give rapid results (usually in 15 minutes) and can be done anywhere. Less sensitive than a PCR test; those who are vaccinated are less likely to test positive early in their illness. If you have symptoms continue to test for several days to be sure negative tests are accurate. Self-tests can be valuable for indicating if you are infectious at that time.

Do I need to report a positive test?

In Massachusetts there is no need to report positive results from a home test (all laboratory PCR-tests will be reported automatically). Let anyone you have been in close contact with over the past five days know that they may have been exposed, as well as any employers, schools, daycares, etc.
