Thursday, November 2, 2023

Virtual meeting as allowed by Ch. 2 of the Acts of 2023 extending certain provisions of the Open Meeting Law, G.L. c.30 sec.20 until March 31, 2025.

I. Call to Order & Open Meeting Law Statement

Chair Malcolm Fick called the meeting to order at 4:01 p.m. as a virtual meeting as allowed by Ch. 2 of the Acts of 2023 extending certain provisions of the Open Meeting Law, G.L. c.30 sec.20 until March 31, 2025. He stated that BRPC was recording the meeting, and anyone else who wanted to record it needed to inform him.

III. Approval of October 5, 2023 Minutes

Sheila Irvin moved to approve the October 5, 2023 meeting minutes. The motion was seconded by Roger Bolton and approved by a roll call vote from Malcolm Fick, Sheila Irvin, Buck Donovan, Kyle Hanlon, and Roger Bolton. Doug McNally and Sam Haupt abstained.

IV. Financial Reports

A. September 30 to October 18, 2023 Expenditures Report

Kyle Hanlon moved to accept the report as presented, and Sam Haupt seconded the motion. A roll vote approved it from Malcolm Fick, Sheila Irvin, Buck Donovan, Doug McNally, Roger Bolton, Kyle Hanlon, and Sam Haupt.

B. Accounts Receivable Report/Assessments October 26, 2023

Several of the 90-day plus invoices have been paid.

C. Line of Credit Report

It has not been used.

V. Comments from Berkshire Regional Planning Commission Delegates and Alternates

Roger asked about the implications for BRPC if the Rest of the River committee disbands. Tom said a decision may be made at the November meeting, and the intergovernmental agreement expires on December 6. He isn't sure what role BRPC will play in the future. Perhaps technical assistance to municipal employees if requested.

Doug announced that the BRTA is working to extend evening hours, and finding three CDL drivers is a sticking point. BRTA is working with the Workforce Board to find drivers. Tom said BRPC is working on a meeting with BRTA.

VI. Items Requiring Action

A. Vote to Approve (after the fact) a Grant Application to the National Environmental Health Association (NEHE) and US Food & Drug Administration (FDA)

The Executive Committee authorized the Executive Director (after the fact) to submit a grant application and sign any resulting contracts and agreements to the National Environmental Health Association (NEHE) and U.S. Food & Drug Administration (F.D.A.) program. The \$5,000 grant would cover food-related inspection training expenses for BRPC Public Health Inspectors and staff. There is no match. Senior Public Health Planner <u>Sandra Martin</u> is the BRPC contact.

Doug McNally motioned to approve (after the fact) submitting a grant application and signing any contracts and agreements to the National Environmental Health Association (NEHE) and US Food & Drug Administration (FDA) for food-related inspection training for Public Health staff. Roger Bolton seconded it. A roll vote approved it from Malcolm Fick, Sheila Irvin, Buck Donovan, Doug McNally, Roger Bolton, Kyle Hanlon, and Sam Haupt.

B. Vote to Approve University of Baltimore Center for Drug Policy and Prevention's Combating Overdose through Community-level Intervention (COCLI) Subaward

The Executive Committee was requested to authorize the Executive Director to submit a grant application to the University of Baltimore Center for Drug Policy and Prevention's Combating Overdose through Community-level Intervention (COCLI) Subaward and sign any resulting contracts and agreements. Berkshire Overdose Addiction Prevention Collaborative (BOAPC) would supplement and enhance the implementation of the <u>Berkshire Post</u> Overdose Program (BPOP). This new initiative provides EMS and Behavioral Health co-response to those who have recently experienced an overdose or are at higher risk for overdose. This \$150,000 one-year grant would be a collaborative project between BRPC, the New England High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas (NEHIDTA) program - Overdose Response Strategy (ORS), Berkshire Harm Reduction, Northern Berkshire EMS, County Ambulance, Southern Berkshire Ambulance Squad, The Brien Center, and other community partners involved in BOAPC. There is no match required. Staff lead on this project is <u>Andy Ottoson</u>, ex. 37

Roger Bolton motioned to authorize the Executive Director to submit a grant application to the University of Baltimore Center for Drug Policy and Prevention's Combating Overdose through Community-level Intervention (COCLI) Subaward and sign any resulting contracts and agreements. Sheila Irvin seconded it. A roll vote approved it from Malcolm Fick, Sheila Irvin, Buck Donovan, Doug McNally, Roger Bolton, Kyle Hanlon, and Sam Haupt.

C. Vote to Submit 2 Grant Applications to MassCEC's EMPower Innovation and Capacity Building Program

The Executive Committee was requested to authorize the Executive Director to submit two grant applications to the MassCEC EmPower Innovation and Capacity Building Program and to sign any resulting contracts and agreements. These grants would prepare the way to apply for implementation funding.

Application 1: Working with West Side Legends and Berkshire Environmental Action Team (BEAT), Environmental and Energy Program staff are applying for \$50,000 to develop a road map for a sustainable solar power pilot program for the West Side and Morning Side communities. The funding would build the capacity of the project partners to develop and support community-based solar programs. The result will be a road map for a community-based solar program developed through community outreach and support.

Application 2: The Environmental and Energy Program is applying for \$50,000 to fund the development of a road map for deploying housing resources effectively countywide. The goal is to connect Housing Authorities and Affordable Housing Trusts to provide technical assistance for effectively spending federal and state money to have the biggest impact on housing energy efficiency upgrades. As part of this capacity building grant, BRPC staff will explore the need and viability of creating a revolving loan fund in partnership with other housing organizations.

MassCEC's expectation is that Innovation and Capacity Building Grants will serve as "seed" funding for the planning of innovative program models or projects. Grant recipients will then apply in a subsequent funding round to implement the project under an Implementation Grant of up to \$150,000 (\$300,000 if the project meets certain priority goals). Application 2 falls into one of Mass CEC's Priority funding categories, making a future implementation grant application eligible for up to \$300,000.

These applications have no BRPC match requirement. The primary staff contact for these grant submissions is <u>Sherdyl Fernandez-Aubert</u>.

Doug McNally motioned to authorize the Executive Director to submit two grant applications to the MassCEC EmPower Innovation and Capacity Building Program and to sign any resulting contracts and agreements. Application 1: Development of a road map for a sustainable solar power pilot program for Pittsfield's West Side and Morning Side communities. Application 2: Development of a road map to deploy housing energy efficiency upgrades via Housing Authorities and Affordable Housing Trusts that may include a revolving loan fund. Roger Bolton seconded it. A roll vote approved it from Malcolm Fick, Sheila Irvin, Buck Donovan, Doug McNally, Roger Bolton, Kyle Hanlon, and Sam Haupt.

D. Approval of Surplus Equipment

The Executive Committee was requested to approve a list of surplus equipment. According to BRPC Policy, depending on the value and condition of equipment, it is offered to municipalities, non-profits and then advertised for sale or offered to staff. Finally, if there is no interest, it is responsibly destroyed.

Roger Bolton motioned to approve the list of surplus equipment. Kyle Hanlon seconded it. A roll vote approved it from Malcolm Fick, Sheila Irvin, Buck Donovan, Doug McNally, Roger Bolton, Kyle Hanlon, and Sam Haupt.

E. Vote to Approve a New Americans with Disabilities Act Policy Statement

The Executive Committee was requested to approve the Americans with Disabilities Act Policy Statement. The ADA Policy Statement is a new BRPC policy statement to inform employees and applicants that BRPC is committed to complying with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Sheila Irvin motioned to approve the Americans with Disabilities Act Policy Statement. Doug McNally seconded it. A roll vote approved it from Malcolm Fick, Sheila Irvin, Buck Donovan, Doug McNally, Roger Bolton, Kyle Hanlon, and Sam Haupt.

F. Vote to Approve a New Pregnancy Anti-Discrimination & Accommodations Policy

Approval was requested to approve the Pregnancy Anit-Discrimination & Accommodations Policy. The new policy states that BRPC will comply with all federal and state laws concerning the employment of pregnant persons or persons with pregnancy-related conditions and nursing mothers.

Doug McNally motioned to approve the Pregnancy Anit-Discrimination & Accommodations Policy. Kyle Hanlon seconded it. A roll vote approved it from Malcolm Fick, Sheila Irvin, Buck Donovan, Doug McNally, Roger Bolton, Kyle Hanlon, and Sam Haupt.

VII. Committee Reports and Discussion A. Regional Issues Committee

The Regional Issues Committee met on October 25, 2023. Discussion continued about commercial scale solar. Concerns were raised that attempts to incentivize solar in the Commonwealth have involved pushes for greenfield development vs. grey field/parking lot/rooftop development. This may disproportionately impact the Berkshires given low population densities, availability of large tracts of land, and lower property values compared to the balance of the state. Sheila noted that Christine did a great job facilitating the meeting.

There was a discussion about school buildings using renewable energy. It was agreed that a letter to the relevant Commonwealth energy should be sent urging prioritization of renewable energy investments for long-term savings and climate goals. Tom said the Municipal Modernization Bill may be an opportunity for this.

B. Other Committees

The Finance Committee will meet when the audit is ready. Auditors were in the office for three days this week; it was a lot of work for the Administration Program staff. There were no findings.

- <u>West-East Rail</u> The Co-Chairs of the Special Commission to address West-East Passenger Rail governance and operations provided a draft report to Commission members for review. The final report may be released soon.
- <u>Berkshire Flyer</u> The Berkshire Flyer finished its season (through October 9th). The oversight group will have a de-brief meeting in December to discuss what worked well or didn't and then start preparing for next year.
- <u>Northern Tier Passenger Rail</u> There was a virtual public meeting on the Northern Tier Rail Study on Thursday, October 26, 2023, at 6:00 p.m.<u>https://www.mass.gov/northern-tier-passenger-</u> <u>rail-study</u>. The primary focus of this meeting was a review of additional alternatives (so-called Phase 2), developed based on earlier public comments.

G. Housing Bond Bill

On October 18, 2023, the Healey Administration filed the Affordable Homes Act, a comprehensive bill related to many aspects of housing development. While the legislature must approve this, which may take several months, it contains many strong elements to support housing development. More information at <u>Housing Bond Bill</u> <u>Mass.gov</u>

H. ResilientMass Plan

The Healey Administration recently released the ResilientMass Plan. This State Hazard Mitigation and Climate Adaptation Plan (SHMCAP) integrates a hazard mitigation plan and a climate change adaptation plan. It identifies strategies and specific, measurable actions state agencies can take individually or through interagency partnerships— to address risks to the human health and safety, communities, critical assets and infrastructure, natural resources, governance, and economy of the Commonwealth. I. Starter Home Zoning – Chapter 40Y

In late 2022, amendments were made to MGL 40R. Along with other changes, the amendments uncoupled the Starter Home provisions from 40R and created a new chapter, MGL 40Y. "Starter Homes" are statutorily defined as "a single-family home not exceeding 1,850 square feet in heated living area." The Starter Home Program is a voluntary incentive program to encourage municipalities to adopt zoning that allows housing development of at least four units/acre. The Executive Office of Housing and Livable Communities seeks input as it develops new regulations to comply with the changes. Contact Bill Reyelt at <u>william.reyelt@mass.gov</u>.

Roger suggested that the program would also benefit retirees, not just first time homeowners. This may be a topic for a Commission meeting. The regulations will be issued in January.

J. Public Health Performance Standards

The Massachusetts Department of Public Health (DPH) established for the first time a set of performance standards, credentials, and workforce training requirements for local public health departments. These standards, created in close collaboration with local public health partners, are an important step toward providing consistent, high-quality public health services for all Commonwealth residents. More information is at <u>Performance Standards for Local Public Health | Mass.gov</u>.

K. Community One Stop for Growth Awards

On October 25, 2023 the Healey administration announced the Community One Stop for Growth awards, including the MassWorks awards. The Berkshires received 19 awards in 10 municipalities, including 10 municipal awards, totaling \$8.2 million of the \$164 million to 338 projects in 161 Massachusetts awarded statewide.

L. Recommendations of the Climate Chief

The Healey administration created the Office of Climate Innovation and Resilience and appointed Melissa Hoffer as the nation's first cabinet-level Climate Chief. This office has reviewed the present organization, staffing, and policy-making practices of the Commonwealth's executive department agencies and offices and has prepared a report and recommendations, <u>Recommendations of the Climate Chief | Mass.gov</u>. The report presents 39 recommendations focused on concrete strategies around funding, protecting environmental justice communities, advancing the workforce, and economic development.

VI. Items Requiring Action

A. Vote to Approve Submission of a Grant Application to the Executive Office of Technology Services and Security's Municipal Cybersecurity Awareness Grant Program

The Executive Committee is requested to authorize the Executive Director to submit a grant application and sign any resulting contracts and agreements to the Massachusetts Executive Office of Technology Services and Security's Municipal Cybersecurity Awareness Grant program. Through this grant, BRPC will gain access to free cybersecurity training for all employees throughout 2024. This grant does not provide any money to BRPC, just access to the training program. Mark Maloy, <u>mmaloy@berkshireplanning.org</u>, is the BRPC contact.

B. Vote to Approve Changes to the BRPC Personnel Pay Plan to Add a Public Health Social Worker Position and Change the Pay Range of the Public Health Nurse Position

The Executive Committee is requested to approve changes to the BRPC Personnel Pay Plan to add a Public Health Social Worker position and change the pay range of the Public Health Nurse Position.

Some of the responsibilities of the Social Worker position would be to plan, coordinate, and provide direct social services, health education and support to community members, municipal boards, and BRPC Program staff, support Health Equity planning and provide support to our Berkshire Public Health Alliance inspectors and public health nurses during housing inspections or disease investigation as requested when mental health or other social service issues are identified or suspected.

An increase in the pay range for the Public Health Nurse Position is necessary for us to keep pace with the market. Nurses are in high demand, and we need to offer competitive pay.

C. Vote to Submit Comments on the New England Power Company -E131 Asset Condition Refurbishment Project, Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR), Adams, North Adams, Florida, and Monroe to the Massachusetts Environmental Policy Act Office (MEPA) The Executive Committee is requested to authorize the Executive Director to submit comments to MEPA on the Draft Environmental Report (DEIR) on the E131 Asset Condition Refurbishment Project in Adams, North Adams, Florida, and Monroe submitted by the New England Power Company. The Environmental Review Committee approved comments which are included in the meeting materials.

D. Vote to Approve Comments on the NSTAR WT-02 Transmission Right-of-Way Reliability Program (TRRP) Project, Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR), Hancock, Lanesborough, Cheshire, Dalton, and Hinsdale to the Massachusetts Environmental Policy Act Office (MEPA)

The Executive Committee is requested to authorize the Executive Director to submit comments to MEPA on the Draft Environmental Report (DEIR) on the NSTAR WT-02 Transmission Right-of-Way Reliability Program (TRRP) Project), Hancock, Lanesborough, Cheshire, Dalton, and Hinsdale submitted by the NSTAR dba Eversource Energy. The Project seeks to improve system reliability by reducing the number of tree fall-in risks in the Right of Way and to create a sustainable environment comprised of vegetation that can safely coexist with the transmission lines. The Environmental Review Committee is meeting on December 5, 2023 to discuss this project. Comments will be sent separately.

E. Vote to Approve Comments on the Massachusetts Internet for All Plan to the Massachusetts Broadband Institute (MBI)

The Executive Committee is requested to authorize the Executive Director to submit comments to the Massachusetts Broadband Institute on the Massachusetts Internet for All Plan. MBI is the central broadband office for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. Its stated goal is to bring Affordable, high-speed internet to every person in Massachusetts. This plan is the blueprint for how the Commonwealth will spend funds it has received through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. Senior Planner Wylie Goodman has been seeking input to inform our comments (there is another Zoom session next Tuesday, 12/5/23 at 6:30.) Comments, which are due December 15th, will be finalized after that session and sent separately. The plan can be accessed at Massachusetts Internet for All Plan | MBI (masstech.org).

Connecting Economic Development efforts to Housing and Transportation was discussed as a focus for FY 2024. Draft unapproved minutes are in the packet.

C. Environmental Review Committee

The Environmental Review Committee met on November 27, 2023 and discussed the New England Power Company - E131 Asset Condition Refurbishment Project, Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR), Adams, North Adams, Florida, and Monroe and voted to submit comments to e Massachusetts Environmental Policy Act Office (MEPA). The committee's general practices were also discussed. Draft minutes are not yet available. Given that there are relatively few meetings, the fact that it takes a fair amount of time to administer annual committee membership, it takes committee members several meetings to understand the working of that committee and many committee members stay in their role and on committees for multiple years, it may be more efficient to clearly extend the terms.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The New England Power Company (NEP) E131 Asset Condition Refurbishment Project (the Project) spans four municipalities in Massachusetts: Adams, North Adams, Florida, and Monroe. The Project's stated goals are to upgrade existing electrical utility infrastructure and construct improved roadways by which the transmission line can be accessed. These access roads will facilitate the proposed infrastructure improvements, as well as future maintenance activities and access by emergency personnel.

The E131 transmission line easement rights range between 200 and 400 feet wide, with the existing line at the approximate center of the easement. The current maintained width ranges from approximately 100 feet to approximately 150 feet. The maintained right-of-way (ROW) includes uplands, wetlands, perennial and intermittent streams, unimproved access routes, and improved gravel access roads. Approximately six miles of Line E131 passes through the MA Department of Conservation & Recreation (DCR)-owned Monroe, Florida, and Savoy Mountain State Forests. Line E131 traverses through mountainous terrain with steep slopes, rocky outcrops, cliffs, and large boulders. Although it passes through some rural residential areas in the Towns of Florida and Monroe, the ROW and surrounding areas are generally densely forested.

Line E131 was constructed in 1925. The existing wooden H-frame transmission structures are from its original construction. In 1971, reconductoring and shield wire installation updates were conducted throughout the line. In 2004, the line was refurbished with select replacement structures, replacement insulators, and improved grounding. Generally, the line is currently comprised of original wooden H-frame and steel lattice structures.

Based on the age of the infrastructure, a full refurbishment of the line is proposed to bring the utility into compliance with modern standards. The proposed Project will include the following:

- Replacement of 151 structures with new steel pole H-frame structures
- Replacement of 6 triple pole structures
- Replacement of three (3) existing steel lattice structures with new steel structures
- Removal of four (4) existing H-frame structures and one (1) lattice structure
- Installation of approximately 24 structures requiring concrete caisson foundations at locations which require greater structural reinforcement
- Installation of micropile foundations at approximately one (1) structure location which requires greater structural reinforcement
- Installation of three (3) new switch gear structures
- Replacement of existing shield wire with fiber optic ground wire (OPGW)
- Replacement of all insulators and hardware
- Replacement of conductor in four (4) sections for constructability purposes

Due to the age of the line, the complex and varied terrain through which it traverses, and lack of recent broad-scale upgrades, access to and along the ROW is limited, and many portions of the line are currently inaccessible except by foot or utility terrain vehicles. Improvements to existing and construction of new access routes are required to facilitate the Project and its long-term maintenance. Given the mountainous topography over which the ROW extends, significant road improvements and construction of new roads are necessary to provide safe, reliable, and constructable access to structure locations and wire-pulling setups. This work will involve grading, tree removal, and gravel placement to safely navigate steep slopes. The proposed access road improvements will allow for future access for regular maintenance, including forestry management and overhead line work, or during emergency events such as storm responses.

Temporary access in the form of construction matting is proposed in sensitive areas including wetlands, stream spans, and rare species habitats. No permanent access roads are proposed within Bordering Vegetated Wetlands (BVW). However, due to the abundance of wetland resource areas along the ROW and the complexity of the terrain, the construction of new or improved access within Bordering Land Subject to Flooding (BLSF), Riverfront Area, and the 100-foot Buffer Zone is unavoidable. These impacts have been minimized to the extent feasible, while balancing safety and constructability.

Required Permits & MEPA Thresholds

The proposed project has met or exceeded MEPA review thresholds for a Mandatory Environmental Impact Report (EIR). The Secretary's Certificate was issued on March 17, 2023. The Certificate denied the request for Single EIR and requested the preparation of a Draft and Final EIR.

ENF Review:

PROJECT CHANGES SINCE THE EENF

The Project's design standard parameters are unchanged since the EENF, but reassessment of impact areas has resulted in changes to impact numbers and Project sequencing. These modifications and

updates do not significantly alter the analyses and conclusions provided in the EENF. NEP has designed the Project to avoid environmental impacts to the maximum extent practicable and as the Project design has progressed, the extent of proposed tree removal has been minimized and the potential impacts to resource areas have been generally reduced.

Land Alteration

Since the EENF, NEP has evaluated the access routes proposed on and off ROW. One access road located within the Monroe State Forest, off ROW access road to Structures 67 and 68, was re-assessed and deemed not required to access the line, as access was feasible east and west of the structures from other routes. Improvement to this, an approximately one-mile-long access route, has been removed from the scope of work and land alteration impacts numbers, resulting in a decrease of 1.06 acres of land disturbance at this location.

Tree Removal

Since the EENF, NEP has refined its assessment of tree removal locations. Factors such as existing open access routes, width of tree removal needed, assessment of proposed tree removal between routes, and site visits to confirm tree density were all evaluated to reduce the overall tree removal area from 17.6 acres as proposed in the EENF to 11.3 acres throughout the Project in Massachusetts.

Wetland Resources

Since the EENF, NEP reevaluated the need for the previously proposed permanent culverts located near Structure 165. Upon further evaluation to reduce impacts to wetland resource areas, specifically inland Bank and Land Under Water and Waterways, the culverts have been removed from the Project scope. The intermittent stream channels will be temporarily spanned with construction matting during construction for access along the ROW.

NHESP Rare Species Habitat

Since the EENF, NEP has been in communication with NHESP during initial regulatory review to assess potential areas to avoid, minimize, and mitigate impacts to rare species. Particular attention has been paid to the rare species habitat located within proximity to the Adams Substation in Adams, MA. The NEP project team coordinated with NHESP to create a phased matting plan for work in this area. Construction matting in the area of the Adams Substation will be placed outside the growing season for the known rare species. If any additional matting is needed during the growing season to facilitate OPGW installation, matting will only be in place for a maximum of four (4) consecutive weeks. Although impacts will be avoided and minimized to the maximum extent practicable, without compromising the safety of Project construction and future maintenance personnel, a "take" is anticipated for one protected species. NEP will prepare a Conservation Management Plan (CMP) for the species that will experience a "take".

RESOURCE AREA IMPACTS OVERVIEW

The proposed Project will result in both temporary and permanent impacts to wetland resource areas including: Bank, Bordering Vegetated Wetlands (BVW), Land Under Water Bodies and Waterways (LUWW), Bordering Land Subject to Flooding (BLSF), Riverfront Area and the 100-foot Buffer Zone. Temporary impacts to BVW and BLSF are due to construction access, staging, and installation of structure foundations where vegetated wetlands and flood prone wetlands currently exist, and replacement structures cannot be sited outside their limits. Permanent impacts are associated with the installation of two culverts; a new switch structure; the installation of concrete caisson foundations for the replacement of four structures and the replacement and relocation of five structures to BVW via

direct embed methods. The EENF states that these areas were closely evaluated for alternatives but designs that relocated structures outside of BVW were deemed infeasible. Modifications to existing access, construction of new access, establishment of laydown areas, and installation of work pads will result in temporary and permanent impacts to Riverfront Area and 100-foot Buffer Zone.

Temporary access comprised of construction matting is proposed in sensitive areas including wetlands, BLSF stream spans, and rare species habitats. No new permanent access roads are proposed within BVW, BLSF or within Land Under Water Bodies and Waterways. However, the construction of new or improved access is proposed within Riverfront Area and 100-foot Buffer Zone to BVW. According to the EENF, these impacts have been minimized to the extent practicable, while balancing safety and constructability.

Summary of Project Impacts

No impacts are proposed to Vernal Pools, Land Under Water and Waterways, or inland Bank.

ALTERNATIVES ANALYSIS

The Secretary's Certificate on the EENF noted that the DEIR should include an expanded alternatives analysis that demonstrates the Project is taking all feasible measures to avoid and minimize environmental impacts to wetland resource areas and mapped habitat, as well as tree removal, which is consistent with requirements pursuant to all applicable regulations.

This Project consists of repairs and improvements to existing assets. No new or expanded ROW is required for the Project and no new utility construction is proposed, other than for access and work pads to facilitate the replacement of existing structures and long-term maintenance, emergency access and storm response. Therefore, there are no route alternatives for this Project. This expanded alternative analysis presents a No Build Alternative and options for selective/targeted maintenance and improvements.

NEP conducted an alternatives analysis to compare feasible alternatives that meet the Project need. The alternatives were evaluated based on environmental impact, cost, reliability, construction feasibility, long-term benefit, and compliance with Independent System Operator-New England (ISO-NE) and the National Electric Safety Code (NESC).

The Alternatives Analysis presented in the DEIR considered the following alternatives for the Project:

- No Build Alternative;
- Critical Asset Repair Alternative;
- Reduced Build/Impact Alternative;
- Maximum Build Out Alternative; and
- Comprehensive Refurbishment Alternative (the Project).

No Build Alternative: According to the DEIR, the No Build alternative does not achieve the Project's goals and benefits. The Project consists of maintenance and improvements to existing assets. If no action is taken, deteriorating structures will pose a safety risk to NEP personnel and members of the public. In addition, if the E131 line is not refurbished, the existing system will remain at risk for failure. Given the asset condition of the existing E131 line and the need to improve high-speed communications between the substations this circuit serves, the No Build Alternative was not considered to be a feasible option.

Critical Asset Repair Alternative: NEP considered addressing only the most critical asset related issues. However, this would require returning to the E131 line repeatedly over the next several years to complete less critical maintenance and improvement activities and it would not accomplish all of the safety and reliability needs for the E131 line. Specifically, this alternative was not selected due to the following:

- Repeated construction with and impacts to DCR State Forest lands;
- Repeated impacts to BVW and other environmental resources and rare species habitat;
- Concerns with asset reliability;
- Increased cost and inefficiency of repeatedly revisiting the same ROW within a short timespan; and
- Failure to meet the need for improving the reliability of the existing communications between the substations served by the circuit.

Reduced Build/Impact Alternative: The Reduced Build/Impact alternative is comprised of Project sitespecific impact considerations required in 310 CMR 10.00 and 314 CMR 9.00 that provide fewer environmental impacts. This alternative does not best meet the identified project need given the existing Project site constraints while avoiding and minimizing environmental impacts to wetland resource areas, mapped habitat, and tree removal to the maximum extent practicable. Nevertheless, in an effort to further reduce impacts, NEP evaluated the potential to eliminate or minimize off-ROW access road construction and to relocate, forego or otherwise alter the proposed installation of new switch Structure 79A to reduce the Project's permanent impacts to vegetated wetlands.

- Working within the ROW reduces impacts to adjacent property and existing DCR access routes, but would not eliminate them and does not reduce the overall impacts to land development, sensitive resource areas, open space land, or construction timelines.
- The existing switch located at Structure 80 must be replaced because the current switch is composed of outdated technology. The switch, if left in its current condition, is a risk to the health and safety of the crews tasked with operating it. The age of the switch also poses reliability issues that, if left unattended, would undermine the stated goal of the Project, to improve the resiliency and operability of the E131 line.

Maximum Build Out Alternative: NEP considered a Maximum Build Out alternative that would have entailed developing the access route to the greatest extent feasible without consideration for overall land and sensitive resource areas impacts or cost. This alternative would look to install larger work pads and access roads would have been designed to be 20-foot wide to better facilitate access of large equipment and continued future access along the ROW. Culverts would be proposed along the access routes to create permanent stream crossings for future ease of access along the ROW. Areas of small wetland crossings would propose to be filled for permanent access. The structure relocations and foundation installations would be designed to benefit conductor reconfiguration and span distances regardless of sensitive resource areas. The maximum build would not restore temporary pull pads to allow for future use should the occasion arise. Additionally, the creation of new access roads would create switchback cuts or grading within the existing easement to make up changes in elevation (greater impacts to forestry and land clearing) instead of using already-created pathways that can be updated to facilitate proposed equipment use. This alternative would decrease the likelihood of repeated future disturbance to sensitive resource areas but would cause increased permanent impacts to the environment.

Comprehensive Refurbishment (Proposed Preferred Alternative): The Preferred Alternative proposed presents a comprehensive refurbishment of the E131 line with the appropriate access, replacement of existing structures, and the replacement of the existing shield wire with OPGW. Providing an efficient means of addressing asset condition concerns and allowing high speed communications between substations addresses the need without repeated impacts to wetland resource areas, rare species habitat, and public open space. According to the EENF, this fullscale refurbishment meets all Project objectives and reduces long-term environmental impacts.

RESPONSE TO BRPC COMMENTS ON THE EENF

<u>BRPC Comment</u>: Include an analysis of alternative methods such as tracked construction vehicles and/or the use of industrial-type helicopters to carry and install; equipment, concrete, piers and poles. BRPC shares the concerns raised by the Hoosic River Watershed Association (HooRWA). Such alternatives would significantly reduce tree cutting and impacts to resource areas.

<u>Response</u>: NEP plans to utilize tracked construction vehicles to the extent practicable to construct 12foot-wide access roads. However, due to site constraints (including very steep slopes) and equipment required for the rebuild Project, additional non-tracked equipment and vehicles will be required. Access road development is being completed to facilitate standard electric utility construction vehicles and equipment. While helicopters can be used in some instances (lighter-lift work related to pulling rope, flying x-braces and insulators, etc.), this will not be feasible for this Project. Access to the proposed structure locations is still required by drilling trucks in order to bore holes for dead-end and tangent structures, due to the amount of bedrock/ledge present on site.

<u>BRPC Comment</u>: Provide an alternatives analysis relative to the permanent impacts associated with the replacement and relocation of five structures to Bordering Vegetated Wetlands (BVW) via direct embed methods.

<u>Response</u>: Please refer to DEIR narrative Section 6 regarding reasons for relocation of the five structures to BVW and site constraints.

<u>BRPC Comment</u>: Provide greater clarification with regard to why permanent access roads that do not currently exist are necessary.

<u>Response</u>: Please refer to DEIR narrative Section 2 Alternative Analysis regarding existing site constraints, including very steep terrain, which would otherwise require multiple switchbacks and in most cases greater environmental impacts within the existing, maintained ROW rather than proposing permanent off-ROW access. Additionally, permanent access roads will allow for both structure installation and required future maintenance.

<u>BRPC Comment</u>: Provide clarification with regard to the selection of steel structures and/or an alternatives analysis comparing wooden versus steel structures. The current wooden structures, which

are proposed to be replaced with steel structures were installed in 1925 and have withstood the test of time in standing for nearly 100 years.

<u>Response</u>: NEP selected steel structures based on product standardization and lifespan maintenance requirements to support reliability. Steel structures reduce the frequency of maintenance related to woodpecker damage and wood rot.

<u>BRPC Comment</u>: Provide greater detail with regard to proposed mitigation measures including specific details related to wetland mitigation and replication.

<u>Response</u>: Proposed mitigation measures are described in DEIR narrative Section 4 and Table 15-1. Please refer to DEIR narrative Section 6 regarding wetland restoration and mitigation.

<u>BRPC Comment</u>: Clarify what methods will be used to control invasive species if they are to become established within the ROW.

<u>Response</u>: Employees and contractors maintaining vegetation on ROWs and substations must follow the NEP ROW Vegetation and Substation Vegetation Management Plans (VMPs) [current VMP: Massachusetts Five-Year Vegetation Management Plan, 2018-2023]. NEP utilizes an Integrated Vegetation Management (IVM) program that is an environmentally responsible means of combining biological, chemical, and mechanical treatment methods (mowing, selective pruning, and hand-cutting) with an understanding of the stages of ecological succession and interspecies competition.

<u>BRPC Comment</u>: In addition, BRPC has concerns regarding the capacity of the electrical grid in relation to the Commonwealth's electrification goals. The EENF states that in addition to the refurbishment work, the existing circuits will be adapted to provide high speed communications between substations by replacing existing shield wire with fiber optic ground wire (OPGW). The EENF states that a strong and reliable electrical transmission and distribution system is vital to the region's safety, security, and economic prosperity and that benefits of the project include a strengthened transmission system in western New England that offers greater reliability and safety for customers. However, it is not clear whether the project will directly address the anticipated future demand or whether additional work would be needed in the future.

Response: Comment acknowledged.

BRPC STAFF COMMENTS ON DEIR

The DEIR should present a reasonably complete and stand-alone description and analysis of the Project and its alternatives, and an assessment of its potential environmental and public health impacts and mitigation measures. The Proponent shall ordinarily use the review and comments on the DEIR as an additional opportunity to improve the planning and design of the Project.

Comments are intended for incorporation into the Final EIR to provide greater clarity and/or improve the planning and design of the Project.

BRPC continues to have significant concerns regarding the capacity of the electrical grid in relation to the Commonwealth's electrification goals. The EENF states that in addition to the refurbishment work, the existing circuits will be adapted to provide high speed communications between substations by replacing existing shield wire with fiber optic ground wire (OPGW). The EENF states that a strong and reliable electrical transmission and distribution system is vital to the region's safety, security, and economic prosperity and that benefits of the project include a strengthened transmission system in western New England that offers greater reliability and safety for customers. However, it is not clear whether the project will directly address the anticipated future demand or whether additional work

would be needed in the future. The DEIR simply acknowledges this concern and mere acknowledgment isn't at all sufficient.

The DEIR is not consistent with the EENF in quantifying resource impacts. The Final EIR should provide greater clarity and/or consistency with regard to how impacts are quantified. Discrepancies should be corrected and changes to project impacts should be clearly identified.

According to the EENF, permanent impacts are associated with the replacement and relocation of five structures to BVW via direct embed methods. The EENF stated that these areas were closely evaluated for alternatives but designs that relocated structures outside of BVW were deemed infeasible. However, this detail is absent within the alternatives analysis. The DEIR refers to narrative Section 6 regarding reasons for relocation of the five structures to BVW and site constraints. Section 6 states "Whenever feasible, NEP sited proposed structures in proximity to the existing structures being removed or has relocated structures from wetlands into upland areas." It remains unclear why permanent impacts are associated with the replacement and relocation of five structures to BVW via direct embed methods or how these areas were evaluated for alternatives that relocated structures outside of BVW.

BRPC previously requested greater detail with regard to proposed mitigation measures including specific details related to wetland mitigation and replication. According to the DEIR proposed mitigation measures are described in narrative Section 4 and Table 15-1. Narrative Section 6 is referenced with regard to wetland restoration and mitigation. With regard to wetland mitigation, the DEIR states that "Specific details will be provided later to MassDEP pending further development of mitigation plan discussions with regulators." This detail should be provided within the Final EIR.

The DEIR states that NEP plans to utilize tracked construction vehicles to the extent practicable to construct 12-foot-wide access roads. However, due to site constraints (including very steep slopes) and equipment required for the rebuild Project, additional non-tracked equipment and vehicles will be required. Access road development is being completed to facilitate standard electric utility construction vehicles and equipment. However, there is no discussion with regard to minimizing impacts trough the use of tracked vehicles where access for standard electric utility construction vehicles and equipment is not needed.

The Alternative Analysis describes existing site constraints, including very steep terrain, which would otherwise require multiple switchbacks and in most cases greater environmental impacts within the existing, maintained ROW rather than proposing permanent off-ROW access. The DEIR further states that permanent access roads will allow for both structure installation and required future maintenance. However, it is unclear why new *permanent* access roads are needed beyond those that currently exist or why temporary access roads are infeasible.

The existing wooden structures installed in 1925 have withstood the test of time in standing for nearly 100 years. The Berkshire Regional Planning Commission (BRPC) hereby submits comments on the Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) for the New England Power Company (NEP) E131 Asset Condition Refurbishment Project (EEA# 16663). The proposed project spans four municipalities in Massachusetts: Adams, North Adams, Florida, and Monroe. The project's stated goals are to upgrade existing electrical utility infrastructure and construct improved roadways by which the transmission line can be accessed. These access roads will facilitate the proposed infrastructure improvements, as well as future maintenance activities and access by emergency personnel. The proposed project has met or exceeded MEPA review thresholds for a Mandatory Environmental Impact Report (EIR). On March 17, 2023, the request for Single EIR was denied requiring the preparation of a Draft and Final EIR.

The proposed project will have extensive impacts including permanently altered land, permanently altered Riverfront Area, and new steel structures 25ft higher than the current maximum height of 85ft. Impacts will primarily result from the replacement of structures, installation of new structures and the creation of both temporary and permanent access roads. The Project's design standard parameters are unchanged since the EENF, but reassessment of impact areas has resulted in changes to impact numbers and Project sequencing. According to the DEIR, the extent of proposed tree removal has been minimized and the potential impacts to resource areas have been generally reduced; however, these modifications and updates do not significantly alter the analyses and conclusions provided in the EENF.

BRPC continues to have significant concerns regarding the capacity of the electrical grid in relation to the Commonwealth's electrification goals. The EENF stated that in addition to the refurbishment work, the existing circuits will be adapted to provide high speed communications between substations by replacing existing shield wire with fiber optic ground wire (OPGW). The EENF further stated that a strong and reliable electrical transmission and distribution system is vital to the region's safety, security, and economic prosperity and that benefits of the project include a strengthened transmission system in western New England that offers greater reliability and safety for customers. BRPC's comment on the EENF included a comment stating that it was not clear whether the project will directly address the anticipated future demand or whether additional work would be needed in the future. The DEIR simply acknowledges this concern - mere acknowledgment isn't at all sufficient. NEPs failure to answer this question raises additional questions with regard for the potential for segmentation that should be addressed within the Final EIR.

BRPC offers the following comments intended for incorporation into the Final EIR to provide greater clarity and/or improve the planning and design of the Project.

1. The DEIR is not consistent with the EENF in quantifying resource impacts. The Final EIR should provide greater clarity and/or consistency with regard to how impacts are quantified. Discrepancies should be corrected and changes to project impacts should be clearly identified.

- 2. According to the EENF, permanent impacts are associated with the replacement and relocation of five structures to BVW via direct embed methods. The EENF stated that these areas were closely evaluated for alternatives but designs that relocated structures outside of BVW were deemed infeasible. However, this detail is absent within the alternatives analysis. The DEIR refers to narrative Section 6 regarding reasons for relocation of the five structures to BVW and site constraints. Section 6 states "Whenever feasible, NEP sited proposed structures in proximity to the existing structures being removed or has relocated structures from wetlands into upland areas." It remains unclear why permanent impacts are associated with the replacement and relocation of five structures to BVW via direct embed methods or how these areas were evaluated for alternatives that relocated structures outside of BVW.
- 3. BRPC previously requested greater detail with regard to proposed mitigation measures including specific details related to wetland mitigation and replication. According to the DEIR proposed mitigation measures are described in narrative Section 4 and Table 15-1. Narrative Section 6 is referenced with regard to wetland restoration and mitigation. With regard to wetland mitigation, the DEIR states that "Specific details will be provided later to MassDEP pending further development of mitigation plan discussions with regulators." This detail should be provided within the Final EIR.
- 4. The DEIR states that NEP plans to utilize tracked construction vehicles to the extent practicable to construct 12-foot-wide access roads. However, due to site constraints (including very steep slopes) and equipment required for the rebuild Project, additional non-tracked equipment and vehicles will be required. Access road development is being completed to facilitate standard electric utility construction vehicles and equipment. However, there is no discussion with regard to minimizing impacts through the use of tracked vehicles where access for standard electric utility construction vehicles and equipment is not needed.
- 5. The Alternative Analysis describes existing site constraints, including very steep terrain, which would otherwise require multiple switchbacks and in most cases greater environmental impacts within the existing, maintained ROW rather than proposing permanent off-ROW access. The DEIR further states that permanent access roads will allow for both structure installation and required future maintenance. However, it is unclear why new permanent access roads are needed beyond those that currently exist or why temporary access roads are infeasible.
- 6. The existing wooden structures installed in 1925 have withstood the test of time in standing for nearly 100 years. The DEIR states that NEP selected steel structures based on product standardization and lifespan maintenance requirements to support reliability. According to the DEIR, steel structures reduce the frequency of maintenance related to woodpecker damage and wood rot. The Final EIR should provide more detail with regard to the selection of steel structures for "lifespan maintenance requirements to support reliability" and the frequency and extent to which maintenance is required for wood structures due to woodpecker damage and wood rot.
- 7. The FEIR should address questions related to the capacity of the electrical grid in relation to the Commonwealth's electrification goals. Specifically, the FEIR should clarify whether the project will directly address the anticipated future demand or whether additional work would be needed in the future and clarify that the project is not segmented.

The BRPC Executive Committee endorsed these comments at its meeting on December 7, 2023.
