Berkshire County Public School Enrollment Projections

Berkshire Benchmarks has released its updated Public School Enrollment Projections based on 2024 enrollment data. Based on births and grade-to-grade change for the last 5-10 years for each of our school districts, the projections reflect existing trends and project the trends forward for the next 10 years.



Since 2015, the county has lost 1,967 students, resulting in a K-12 enrollment of 13,944. The projections show a continued decline of our overall K-12 enrollment, with a K-12 enrollment of 11,397 in 2035 - a loss of 2,547 students since 2024. Most of our 17 school districts show a continued decline, but a few, such as Central Berkshire, Hoosac Valley, Lenox, Northern Berkshire Vocational, and Berkshire Arts and Technology Charter, have stable enrollment.

HEAL Recap and Next Steps

December 14th marked the conclusion of the HEALing Communities Study with the premier of Outpost Studio's *Blueprint For Recovery*, a new documentary featuring local



stories of recovery from Opioid Use Disorder (OUD). The film premiered in the House of Corrections, at MCLA and the Colonial Theatre. It includes local experts highlighting the importance of harm reduction, Medication for Opioid Use Disorder (MOUD), and why everyone should carry naloxone. BRPC is extending and expanding these efforts through two new grants to further support people who have recently experienced an overdose or are otherwise at risk for a substance use/ behavioral health crisis. Funded by a three-year Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) Comprehensive Opioid, Stimulant and Substance Use Program (COSSUP) grant, the project includes post-crisis field care through collaborative partnerships with The Brien Center and EMS agencies, preventive outreach from Brien and Community Outreach Specialists through the George B. Crane Memorial Center, and expanded communications campaigns to encourage everyone to carry naloxone while Smashing The Stigma against the disease of addiction. The COSSUP grant is supplemented by a one-year Combating Overdose through Community-Level Intervention (COCLI) grant to further enhance the program. Through twelve years of proactive cooperative efforts, BRPC's partners in the Berkshire Overdose and Addiction Prevention Collaborative (**BOAPC**) have established a strong infrastructure to address the ongoing opioid crisis, though that structure is in strong need of deeper and broader funding. The BOAPC partners are currently updating the strategic plan with an expanded focus on housing, workforce development, addressing Stimulant Use Disorder, and reducing the pervasive misuse of alcohol in the county. These continued collaborations are vital as we continue to reduce the harms from substance misuse and help make the Berkshires thrive!

Transportation

BRPC Retains BETA Group for Safe Streets and Roads for All Project

Berkshire Regional Planning Commission has hired BETA Group to provide technical services to its Transportation Planning Program to develop a Comprehensive Safety Action Plan for Berkshire County. Under the working title of the Berkshire STEPS Plan (Safe Travel and Equity Plan for our Streets), this Action Plan will be developed throughout 2024. Once the plan is developed, policy and project recommendations will be made with the goal of achieving ambitious reductions in road-related fatalities and serious injuries. Completion of the Action Plan opens the door for future Implementation Grant funding under the Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) program; this funding will be utilized to implement the plan's recommendations.

The Action Plan is funded by the SS4A program, a competitive grant administered by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), as a part of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL), otherwise

known as the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA). This grant program is a unique opportunity for communities to partner directly with the FHWA to tackle the growing number of deaths and serious injuries on roads in the USA.

According to the U.S. Department of Transportation:

In 2021, 42,939 people were killed in motor vehicle crashes, of which 7,388 were people walking. Millions more are injured - sometimes permanently - each year. Roadway fatalities and the fatality rate declined consistently for 30 years, but progress has stalled over the last decade and went in the wrong direction in 2020 and 2021.

The Berkshire STEPS Plan will begin with data collection about the safety of our roads, such as historically known areas of crashes, locations where speeding is a persistent issue, and travel patterns and destinations of vulnerable road users, among other components, to generate a High-Injury Network (HIN) map of Berkshire County roads. This network will highlight the greatest opportunities for implementing safety enhancements to reduce future deaths and serious injuries and make travel by all modes of transportation a better experience.

A draft of the STEPS Plan is expected to be completed and available for comment by Fall 2024. More information will be shared as the project progresses. Please contact <u>Nick Russo</u>, Senior Transportation Planner, for more information on this project.
