District Local Technical Assistance (DLTA) Program 2024 Projects

Data & Information Services

The US Department of Agriculture has released the **2022 Census of Agriculture**. Some Berkshire County highlights from the 2022 edition include 471 farms, a loss of 4 farms since 2017. The land in farms has risen from 58,647 in 2017 to 71,860 in 2022, likely due to a change in methodology. Most of the farms in the Berkshires are in the 10 to 49 and 50 to 179-acre categories. The agricultural products' market value is \$36,008,000, an average of \$76,449/farm. 191 of these farms make less than \$2,500/year, while 50 make \$100,000 or more. The



main crops for our farms include animals (188 farms), grain (8), forage (196), and vegetables (123).

Public Health

Rural Vaccine Equity Initiative - Social Determinants of Health

In January 2024, the Public Health Program entered its third year of funding for the Rural Vaccine Equity Initiative administered by the New England Rural Health Association. This grant program addresses the social determinants of health needs of individuals in the rural towns of the central Berkshires by providing aid to direct-service organizations. These funds aim to increase the overall health and well-being of persons in the central Berkshires with a multifaceted approach that targets key demonstrated barriers to health.

In consultation with stakeholders throughout the central Berkshires, priorities in this region were identified as child care, food insecurity, and support for older adults. So far this year, BRPC has received requests from and funded the following organizations and programs based on those priorities:

Becket YMCA: Day camp scholarships for families to send their children to summer camp **Berkshire Pride:** Technology purchases to expand and support their online Safe Spaces training capacity

Child Care of the Berkshires: Child care subsidy for staff retention and recruitment **Central Berkshire Regional School District:** Provisions for the nurses' offices in all five district schools

Richmond Consolidated Schools: Technology items for the library curriculum, gym equipment upgrades, and furniture for the health office

Roundabouts Prove Safer and More Favorable Once Established in Communities

The use of roundabouts in the Commonwealth has grown over the past several decades. Since 2000, 87 roundabouts have been constructed on Massachusetts roads, according to a database maintained by Kittleson and Associates. As these intersections have been studied, they have proven safer, modern, and cost-effective options in the transportation engineering toolbox and have grown more favorable in the public eye.



Every roundabout is unique in terms of the amount of traffic it handles, the context of the land around it, the urban or rural character of the roads, the number of lanes and approaches it handles, and the size of the circle itself. In Berkshire County, the first modern roundabout was constructed in Adams in 2015. Since then, others have been built in Pittsfield and Great Barrington, with another breaking ground in Pittsfield in the summer of 2024.

It is important to note that modern roundabouts are different from *rotaries* that existed in the state long before 2000 and are considered obsolete. Rotaries are large circles, up to and exceeding 300 feet in diameter, contain multiple lanes, and are sometimes controlled by traffic signals. The only junctions that could be considered true "rotaries" in the Berkshires are in Williamstown, at the junction of Route 7 and Route 2, and formerly in Pittsfield, at Park Square.

As with adopting any new convention, there is often apprehension toward the unknowns that come with it. This is true in the Berkshires, as with anywhere. The Transportation Research Board <u>found</u> that attitudes toward roundabouts consistently shifted from majority opposed (54%) to majority in favor (69%) within one to five years after construction. Modern roundabouts in Europe did not enter service until the 1970s and 80s, with just under two dozen between Norway and Switzerland in 1980, according to the USDOT. The Netherlands cautiously adopted roundabouts in sparsely populated areas in the early 1980s. By 2001, there were at least 1,500 roundabouts in the Netherlands. By comparison, North America is a couple of decades behind in following this convention. The first modern roundabout in the U.S. was constructed in 1990. As of 2024, there are now an estimated 10,000+ across the country.

The Berkshire Regional Planning Commission has found that in a sample of Massachusetts roundabouts of similar size and scope to those in Berkshire County, injury-causing crashes consistently declined after the roundabout was constructed. In Adams, there have not been any recorded injury crashes at the roundabout since 2019. One to two crashes were recorded in each of the six years before the roundabout was installed. We expect similar trends at the Berkshires' newer roundabouts and those constructed in the future.
